# [1. Ashish Kumar Saini]

At the outset I would like to express my sincere gratitude towards Dr. Seiji Naito, President of JUA and Dr. Shin Egawa, Chair of the International Committee of JUA for giving me this opportunity of being one of the scholars of the 2015 JUA International Foundation Scholarship for Young Asian Urologists.

It was indeed and honour and privilege to be JUA 2015 scholar and a great opportunity to visit Kagoshima university and learn under the able mentorship of Prof Masayuki Nakagawa. The university hospital runs a robust program of urology with inimitable emphasis on uro-oncology, renal transplant, hemodialysis and pediatric surgery. I received a warm welcome at the airport and the entire faculty, staff and residents extended their full support whenever it was needed to make my stay comfortable. I learned about brachytherapy of prostate and basic research methodology about micro RNA in uro malignancy under the able guidance of Dr Hideki Enokida. The renal transplant program as well as hemodialysis!! was under urology and I learn a lot from this unique opportunity. During the visit I made a lot of Japanese friends and I cherish their friendship.

I visited Fukuoka with Dr Yamane and his team for Kyushu urology program and was felicitated immensely by everybody during the event.

During my stay I visited Nagasaki and was moved by the agony and suffering of the atomic bombing, the process of its restoration was wonderful and the way it looks now! Is breathtaking and spectacular. I salute the Japanese people for accomplishing what was seemed impossible.

The fellowship provide me an opportunity to observe Japanese culture minutely and imbibe their meticulous craftsmanship, punctuality and love for their nation.

After this stay I believe every Indian should visit Japan. I envisage that the entire experience of the work ethics, culture and tradition which I have observe in japan will help me building up myself as a better person and better urologist for myself, my patients and my country

At the beginning, I must mention that visiting Japan is a life changing experience for me. Because In my comparatively short carrier as an urologist in my country like Bangladesh it's a vast experience that I gathered here in such a short time.

I came to know about JUA International Foundation Scholarship for young Asian Urologists from a fellow urologist of my country, Dr. Faisal Islam. He was the JUA scholar from last year. I talked to him about it and he told me what a great experience it was for him. So, I collected the details from him and applied to JUA for the 2015 scholarship. I was so, surprised when I got the scholarship. I am so grateful to JUA for that. Regarding the choice of the training hospital, I was encouraged by Dr. Islam to choose Kumamoto University Hospital. He spoke highly of Sensei Prof. Mashatoshi Eto and told me I'll have a great teaching environment here. As I can say now he was totally right.

This is my first visit to Japan. So, I was excited and a bit confused about the society, culture and people. But Dr. Islam encouraged me and help me a lot to prepare myself for staying in Japan.

My clinical attachment started on 2 th March, 2015 and it will end on 5 th June, 2015. It's stotal of three months. At the beginning I was thinking how this long three months will pass. But the truth is, it passed so quickly. It feels like just a few days back when I stepped in to Fukuoka airport. Now near the end of my attachment I am feeling sad. I think I am going to miss this place and people.

The Urology Department of Kumamoto Urology Hospital welcomed me very warmly. From the first day they received me at the bus station and took me to my dormitory. They also help in many ways to teach me how to use the local transport to reach the hospital and also return to my dorm. They also arranged a welcome party for me which was a great experience. They provide me a working desk, id card and health insurance so that I don't have any problem here. The secretary of Dr. Eto Ms. Chinatsu Yoshimura and Yuki Matsuno were very efficient and helpful and they were very good in English. I should also mentioned about Dr. Kawano and Dr. Sugiyama. They were always there to help me. Above all Dr. Mashatoshi Eto was always there to teach me and explain the surgery and procedures and pros and cons of different technique. He has a great fatherly attitude toward his students. That encouraged me very much.



During my stay I observed many Robot-assisted Laparoscopic Radical Prostatectomy (RALP). Entering the Davinci Robotic Surgery OR was a new horizon for me. This was the first time I saw a Davinci Robot in my own eyes. I am sure most of the doctors in my country haven't. When I first saw Dr. Eto performing RALP, he was

so expert on that and had tremendous skills. I was allowed to watch the surgery in 3D in the second console of Davinci. It was crystal clear and 3 dimensional. I had so many questions and Dr. Eto was patient enough to explained every steps of the surgery. He also showed me RALP with extended radical lymph node dissection and also the nerve sparing approach. I discussed with him about selection of the patient for nerve sparing and also lymph node dissection. He made many things clear. I can't thank him enough for this rare opportunity.

I also observed other laparoscopic procedures like Lap Adrenalectomy, Radical Nephrectomy, Nephroureterectomy and Total Radical cyctectomy with neo Bladder and also urinary diversion. I was fortunate to observe a cadaveric renal transplant which is a rare surgery. I observed A-V fistula surgery with artificial graft and also observed angiography and recanalization of a narrowed A-V fistula. I was encouraged to see many young urologists performing long and complicated procedure and seniors were always there to help and guide them. The doctors are so patient and efficient and the anaesthesiologist is also very skilled to manage the patient in long surgeries lasting 12-14 hours.

I attended the grand round where Dr. Eto ask the other doctors to speak in English. I also attended the weekly uro-radiology conference and learned many things about MRI, CT and PET scan. I also seen USG with Fusion MRI and biopsy for prostate cancer. During the conference I was amazed to see the how the doctors access the patient data from the networked computer and project them in the screen for all to see and discuss the management of the patient. It enriches the knowledge of residents and trainees.

On the day of no operation Dr. Eto was kind enough to arrange to observe surgery in Kumamoto Urology Hospital, a private hospital focused of stone management and female urology. I observed LRP, PVP, PCNL, TOT and TVM. I should also thank Dr. Tanigawa and Dr. Ih for this opportunity.

I also got the opportunity to practice on dry box for laparoscopy and under supervision I could have the experience to use the Davinci Robotic Simulator which was a rare experience for me.

I attended the 103rd JUA Annual meeting. It was held in Kanazawa. Visiting Kanazawa was my first visit outside kumamoto. It was a nice city full of culture and tradition. I observed lectures of many international faculty and met legends like Dr. Mahesh Desai and Dr. Gopal Badlani. I also enjoyed the breathtaking beauty of Japan on my way to Kanazawa.

Many of the urologists here are engaged in various research activity, which is beneficial for the doctors and also for the patients. I also came to know that Kumamoto University is famous for its research in different filed. It encouraged me to get involved in research activity.

The Urologists and residents here follow the National Guidelines, which is up to date and updated frequently. It's a great thing to provide the patients with most advanced and latest treatment.

The experience I had here has enriched my knowledge and skills and also changed my views for my future carrier in urology. I also learned about Japanese culture and tradition. People here are kind, honest, patient, helpful and welcoming. Language barrier is there but it could hardly stop them to extend their helping hand towards the guests.

Lastly, I must say that, this small report is never enough to express my gratitude toward JUA for the opportunity. I am so grateful to Dr. Mashatoshi Eto and all doctors of Kumamoto University Hospital for their kind cooperation. I hope to come back again for more training or research in the field of Urology if there is opportunity. # [3. Dr. Subodh Kumar Regmi]

It was a real honor for me to be selected as a young Asian scholar for the JUA International

Foundation scholarship for 2015. Working as a urologist in Nepal is quite the challenge, considering the fact that it is a speciality still dominated by practicing general surgeons and the practice is limited mostly to open surgical and endourological procedures. Laparoscopic urology is still in its infancy and only a handful of urologists are currently performing a limited number of procedures. Therefore being selected to this scholarship and then being assigned to Keio University under the guidance of Professor M. Oya has been a real learning experience for me.

Upon landing at the Narita Airport on 20th July, I was greeted by warm smiles and greetings from a couple of residents from the department of urology of Keio University and then taken to my living quarters near the campus. The department itself has become like a second home to me and I have been made to feel comfortable by the entire faculty and the residents alike. During my stay Professor Oya ensured that all the weekly academic activities of the department including the grand rounds and clinical meetings were conducted in English so that I could understand the proceedings. It was a warm gesture on his part and everyone involved considering the fact that all activities of the department including the academic ones are in Japanese.

There were a lot of things that I have learnt during my brief stay in Japan. The laparoscopic radical prostatectomy was perhaps the most striking. I had always regarded it as being one of the most difficult and time consuming procedures in urology and had failed to understand that with proper application and dedication it can be a very good procedure to a country like ours where the scope of robotic surgery is out of the reach of the general population. I also had the opportunity to observe SILS procedures in the department which was a completely new learning experience. I had very good and interesting discussion sessions with Dr Miyajima who was kind enough to lend me a few tips regarding various procedures. In addition to the numerous laparoscopic procedures I was also able to see a lot of pediatric urological procedures with Dr Asunama and had interesting discussions with him. In fact all of the faculty members like Dr Kikuchi, Dr Mizuno, Dr Matsumoto, Dr Shinoda, Dr Shinozima were kind enough to discuss the various aspects of their specialities with me.Brachytherapy for

prostate cancer was a completely new area for me and I was lucky enough to observe and understand the principle of the procedure under the guidance of Dr Kosaka and Dr Mizuno. Complicated open surgical procedures for malignant renal and other tumors were also a revelation where I was able to observe the role of inter-departmental cooperation to bring about a successful outcome for the patients.

The highlights of my stay in Japan have not only been the clinical or the academic experiences but also the amazing cultural extravaganza that I have been treated to. I was able to experience the ultra-high tech city life in Tokyo as well as the cultural treat of Kyoto. My visit to Hiroshima made me understand the anguish and the horror of the aftermath of the Atomic bombings. 
